## Monaghan Ranch Antelope Hunt

I was lucky enough to draw a pronghorn tag for a hunt on the Monaghan Ranch this year. Fortunately we were blessed with unusually nice weather for late September, and were there and gone before the big winds of Wyoming started to blow.

The Monaghan Ranch is located a few miles north of the Colorado-Wyoming border, between Tie Siding and Laramie. The ranch is extensive in size, used primarily for grazing grass fed cattle, but it also hosts a rich variety of wildlife, which includes healthy herds of Pronghorn.

The hunt is managed and guided by Mr. Garry Woodman, who is an avid hunter with wide experience. My

helper this year was Dan Brown, an Outdoor Buddies Board Member, with an extensive military background (retired army).

Dan and I arrived at the ranch before 8:00 am, which gave us ample time to hunt in the morning hours. Before hunting began the first order of business was to shoot a round at a qualifying target, at 150 yards. This duty accomplished, we headed out to find a herd.

We encountered several groups of pronghorns, but as often is the case they kept their distance and finally Garry spotted a group that was close enough to provide me with a decent shot. I shot a doe at about 220 yards, albeit the doe was not standing perfectly broadside, and the animal was left standing. We drove a few yards closer and I hit her in the head.

After high 5's and field dressing the animal we returned to the ranch house and

Garry skinned and quartered it.

This was a high quality hunt and all of us had a great time!

Outdoor Buddies expresses our sincere gratitude to Rob DeLine, ranch owner, for granting us the opportunity to hunt on this beautiful ranch property and to Garry Woodman, wildlife manager, for all of his hard work/planning to make this happen. My thanks also to Dan Brown for his

assistance, and Outdoor Buddies for organizing participation in outings like this for the disabled.

Did you know that some places have too much wildlife?

For the past few years, Outdoor Buddies has been working to help alleviate a severe overpopulation of deer in and around Beulah, Colorado. The District Wildlife Manager for that area, Gretchen Holschuh, and landowner, Art Traeber, contacted Outdoor Buddies and invited their help in reducing the deer population there. Disabled hunters use crossbows rather than high powered rifles in taking animals in close proximity to residences.

Outdoor Buddies welcomes any opportunity that provides for getting disabled persons and youth into the outdoors. Our mission is to provide opportunities for those who have been deprived of access and enjoyment of outdoor experiences. The focus is on those who are mobility impaired, with special emphasis on our military veterans, and disadvantaged youth.

Outdoor Buddies always has a waiting list of disabled persons wanting to participate in outdoor activities. Unfortunately, we cannot accommodate as many as we would like due to the limited properties where we have permission from landowners to conduct hunting, fishing and other outdoor activities with disabled members.

Participating in a recent deer hunt at Beulah were Westcliffe Marine Veteran, Brad Bradberry, and Air Force Veteran, Christopher Wolff, from Peyton. Both harvested a deer for their freezer.

## Outdoor Buddies Plans Chukar/Pheasant Hunt

Outdoor Buddies has scheduled an upland bird hunt for Saturday, February 27, 2016 to be held at Drake Land Farms near Goodrich, Colorado.

Drake Land Farms is a hunting club started in 1980. The property includes 867 acres with 1.5 miles of the South Platte River. It is ideal habitat for the event we are planning.

Ducks Unlimited (DU) has a conservation easement on the property and the club is currently

involved in a joint wetland project with DU.

Outdoor Buddies is coordinating this event with Chris Nowak who is a member of the Drake Land Farms hunting club.

Jason Mulso, owner of Fremont Pheasants LLC, will provide the birds for the hunt.

This event promises to provide a lot of shooting because we are planning to plant many birds including a combination of chukars and pheasants. Jason handled a similar event for Outdoor Buddies last March and it was loads of fun

Outdoor Buddies will provide some adaptive equipment for disabled hunters who may need a little help getting around for their hunt. We will have our "Go-Getter" ATV device as well as three Action Track chairs.

This will be an all-day event starting at 9:00 AM. Lunch will be served. Shooting is reserved for disabled members, except for "back-up" shooters.

At the end of the hunt harvested birds will be cleaned and divided with participants who want them.

## Late Season Cow Elk Hunt at Trapper Mine

This year's hunt made me think of a famous quote from the late-great Yogi Berra; "It was like Déjà vu all over again!"

I love the West and I really love to hunt in the West. That's why when given the opportunity to come back for a second cow elk hunt, I didn't let the 19 hour drive from my home in Fishers, Indiana to Craig, Colorado discourage me a bit.

Again, being accompanied by my ever faithful "little brother" I headed west on Highway 70 with great

anticipation of another successful hunt. My first trip out to Colorado to hunt with Outdoor Buddies was in December, 2013. That year it was bitter cold, the animals had migrated down and the Trapper Mine property was covered up with elk. That year my hunt lasted a total of 45 minutes. It would have been even shorter, but I missed the first elk I shot at.

So this year as I traveled back to Craig I replayed that hunt over and over in my mind. Could I get another elk that quickly? Could I get another elk at all?!

This year the weather had been warm and the animals were not coming out of the high country like they had in years past. I had myself prepared to come home empty handed but that's okay, it's all about the experience and fellowship.

The group from Trapper Mine who facilitate the hunt are an amazing bunch of guys! It is always humbling to me when someone takes their very valuable free time and spends it helping others and they do it with such great joy and enthusiasm. We all met for dinner the night before the hunt and again for breakfast the morning of the hunt. It was great to talk to old friends and meet some new friends.

The night before the hunt the Craig area received about 2 inches of snow. I am always filled with greater confidence of a successful hunt with fresh snow! We made our way out to the Trapper Mine property after breakfast and proceeded to load up the trucks we were going to use for the hunt.

The three trucks holding the hunters followed each other through the gate and onto the mine property. A plan was devised on which direction each truck was heading.

We parted and traveled into a small valley and there they were; a herd of about 300 elk!

Rob, my driver/guide looked over at me and said "lock and load!"

As we approached the herd they started to move from our left to right and away from us a bit. I readied my 300 Winchester magnum and watched them through the scope. As I looked at

them I saw bull, spike, small cow, another spike, a big cow but she was standing in front of another cow and so on. It took an agonizing minute or more before I finally found a big cow standing broadside by herself.

I was fortunate to make a one shot kill at 250 yards. After the shot I looked over at the clock in the truck's dash and saw that we had been hunting for less than 10 minutes!

It wasn't so much that the tracks couldn't handle the snow, but the fact that the low clearance in the center caused me to hang up and become easily high-centered. Luckily for us, we found a highly traveled trail and were able to follow with no problems.

After about 30 minutes of searching, the kids found a tree that we were happy to cut down. After all, this was more about the experience than finding the perfect tree. All in all, it was a great day.

The weather was nice, the tree cutting was a success and the company was perfect. I hope to make
