Our Wonderful African Adventure

We have returned from an African adventure of a lifetime, and are already envisioning eight new trophies on our walls, though they will not be shipped for eight or more months. The opportunity to hunt in South Africa started with raising a hand at the Outdoor Buddies Banquet Auction in 2012. So quickly, we were the highest bidder for a 10-day hunt donated by Starr & Bodill Safaris. After talking to other hunters experienced in Africa, we were convinced to add 3 more days to the hunt so that we could enjoy other features that South Africa has to offer, and we are so glad we did, especially since the travel time to get there is approximately 34 hours.

Starr and Bodill Safaris' hunting base is located near Cathcart in the Eastern Cape of South Africa and consists of private ranch concessions with hundreds of thousands of acres available. They have over 30 different species to choose from, ranging from tiny steenbok and duiker to deadly cape buffalo, and just about everything in between. The terrain ranges from rolling grasslands to thick bush and mountains (looks a lot like Wyoming). Its native species are also unique like East Cape kudu, Cape eland, black wildebeest and mountain reedbok; just to name a few. Dwaine and Britney Starr (father and daughter) are based in the USA and Louis Bodill is based in the Eastern Cape. They are excellent at personalized

service and attention to detail, taking a lot of the worry of the unknown out of the equation. Dwaine and Louis are trained, experienced and licensed Professional Hunters (PHs) which are required to outfit a safari in South Africa.

We had 14 months to prepare. We had the essentials; 2 rifles, ammo and experience hunting Colorado style. We received comprehensive step by step instructions. Preparation included investing in shooting sticks, bipods, lockable ammo cases, a better scope, and practice, practice, practice. We put aside our orange for layers of sage green & khaki that was tough enough to stand up to thorny trees and bushes. We read up on all the animals that were available to hunt and chose 8 antelope that we thought would be representative of the region, and fit our budget. We invested in a hunter's guide book "The Perfect Shot: Mini Edition for Africa" by Kevin Robertson. From this book we learned that the anatomy of the So. African plains animals are different from our elk/deer/antelope in that the heart is lower in the chest. The best shot placement is through the shoulders to get the animal down. We were glad to learn that the Eastern Cape is disease free, so no malaria or typhoid prevention was needed.

After being met at the New London Airport, our PHs whisked us inland two hours to lovely accommodations that included a thatched-roof lodge and chalets. Trophies on display in the lodge served to get us excited about what could be. For a bit of history, there are also caves on the property that have bushman paintings in them. Meals in the lodge are also a culinary adventure of local game meats other delicious home cooked fair. Hopes of losing weight on this trip were dashed. Laundry was done every day, which was a great help in keeping luggage weight down to just a few changes in cloths.

We learned that the farmers (we would call them ranchers) in South Africa have spent the last 120+ years bringing the native antelope back after an epidemic of hoof-and-mouth disease nearly wiped them out in the late 1800's. As herds become abundant, the ranchers offer the mature males, the ones that have successfully bred, to be thinned from the herds. So, the ranchers are the country's wildlife conservationists, and our hunting helps finance their efforts.

We each chose four animals that we hoped to harvest. Ron's list included a Waterbuck, Kudu, Impala and Bushbuck, while Diane's list included a Blesbok, Gemsbok, Common Springbok and Blue Wildebeest (Brindled Gnu). They each have unique markings and

horns. Just learning the names took a few months. We hunted on four uniquely different ranches. We will share with you only two hunting stories so as not to bore you.

We were invited to hunt on a 15,000 acre ranch that had several of the animals we were looking for. Ron's morning stalk for a Waterbuck ended up with crosshairs on a prime specimen for 30 minutes, but when it turned its head, showed that one of its horns was atypical. Louie, our PH, called it not a shooter. So we found a nice place for a picnic of wildebeest salad sandwiches and crisps. There Ron spotted two good looking Waterbucks up on the hillside, so lunch was short and the stalk began anew. Walking in a ravine to keep out of site, Ron was preceded by the tracker, and then the PH who held the sticks. The tracking terrier, used to track wounded animals, waited at the truck. When the tracker called a stop from a good spot, the range finder read 260 yards, so Ron chose a prone shot with the bipods. Good thing he had practiced, since he made a great shot that dropped the Waterbuck, only for it to jump back up, and run through the thorn trees. Now shooting on the sticks, a second shot knocked it down, but as is typical with these antelope, up he ran again. Louis remarked that since the Waterbuck was running towards the truck, another shot would not be necessary, and he was right. After the photo, and before the loading, the tracker commented on the thickness and length of the horns, which were considerable. The tracker takes over all the hard work, including the caping, skinning and salting of the trophy and care of the meat, which the ranchers keep.

The next morning, the land lay under a fog that showed the hill tops, but allowed the Gemsbok herd to slip in and out of the thorn trees, back into the mist, as soon as they saw us. The rancher assisted in tracking the herd, being familiar with a short rock ridge that ran the length of the woods where the herd was hiding. As we snuck along the ridge, the mist slowly rose. And

there, through the trees, could be seen just parts of a good Gemsbok. So up the sticks went, and Diane balanced on the sticks, waiting for the shoulder to present itself from behind a tree as the Gemsbok grazed. Wait, another one walked in front, but then was clear, and boom! (Boom is the sound a 300 Ultramag makes.)

Diane always worries that she pulls her shots to the right, and may have missed, but that month of practicing with the sticks worked, and the shoulder shot did its job of stopping the animal in its tracks. Being only 80 yards away helped.

Each day of hunting was an adventure of learning about the country, the animals and the people. We mixed hunting with some touring, going to craft fairs and historic towns. We had tea with the ranchers, and enjoyed warm fires and conversation in the lodges. Now we have a few more hunting stories to tell, photo albums to sort and new friends to stay in touch with.

We highly recommend it!
